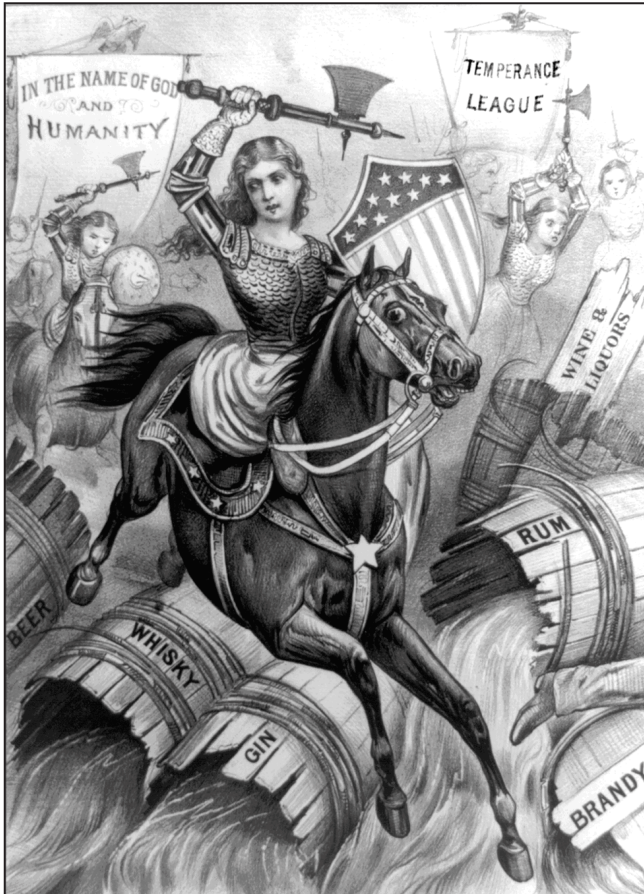

## Woman's Holy War

- Women gained a victory in the “war” shown in the cartoon through the
  - ratification of a constitutional amendment
  - legalization of birth control
  - expansion of missionary activities overseas
  - repeal of national Prohibition
- The “Holy War” illustrated in the cartoon was an effort to
  - recruit women soldiers
  - promote world peace
  - ban the sale of alcoholic beverages
  - spread Christian religious beliefs

- Jacob Riis' photographs and the Settlement House movement led by Jane Addams drew attention to the needs of the
  - freedmen immediately after the Civil War
  - farmers in the 1880's and 1890's
  - urban poor in the late 19th and early 20th centuries
  - Japanese and Chinese laborers in the late 1300's
- Jane Addams, Lillian Wald, and Jacob Riis are best known as
  - social reformers
  - leaders of industry
  - congressional leaders
  - inventors
- National Prohibition, as authorized by the 18th amendment, stated that
  - Americans must be 18 years old to purchase alcoholic beverages
  - only imported alcoholic beverages would be sold
  - alcoholic beverages could be sold only in government-run stores
  - the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages was banned
